

## ZORAN MUSIC

### Biography, Bibliography, Exhibitions

#### **Biography**

Zoran Music was born on 12 February 1909 in Gorizia, at the time part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire. His father was director of a school in Bukovitza, a village not far from Gorizia and his mother a school teacher. At the beginning of the 1930s, Music completed his high school studies, and moved on to study at the Academy of Fine Arts in Zagreb under the tutelage of Lyuba Babic. After completing his studies and with little money available, his desire to visit the paintings of the Great Masters was finally rewarded by his strong determination. He visited Madrid to view works by Goya and El Greco and remained in Spain for more than a year, frequently visiting the Prado Museum and painting copies of Goya's works. He later moved to Toledo, where he studied the artworks by El Greco. Leaving the country at the beginning of the Spanish Civil War, he moved to Dalmatia and the isle of Curzola. In 1943 Music visited Venice for the first time. In this city, he was arrested by the Gestapo and deported to Trieste. Here he was held prisoner in a narrow underground cell flooded with water for nearly four weeks. Music was interrogated and tortured. Given the choice of enlisting in the Istrian special corps associated with the Nazi SS or being sent to Germany, Music chose the deportation. He was sent to Dachau and towards the end of November 1944 is registered as prisoner Number 128231.

Under the extremely difficult conditions of the concentration camp, Music managed to create some sketches of the horrors he was witnessing, with the aim of leaving a trace of those dramatic and inconceivable circumstances. He worked under the terrible risk of being discovered, in unimaginable conditions: hiding ink that he watered down to make it more durable, pieces of paper folded and hidden underneath his shirt, pen and paper stolen from the laboratories where he was made to work with other prisoners. His physical condition almost as frail as the cadavers around him, he somehow found the strength to survive also thanks to his art. Of the nearly two hundred drawings, he managed to save only about thirty-five.

Exhausted and very sick, Music was liberated in 1945 by the Americans and taken to Ljubljana. Even there he had to flee from an imminent arrest from the Communists under Tito, who were accusing him of not having taken part in the Party while in the concentration camp. He escaped from the hospital where he was being treated, hidden in a truck that transported newspapers to Americans allies in Gorizia. In 1946, Music visited his relatives in Gorizia before returning to Venice. He located many friends of his, who offered him help and assistance. The painter Malipiero allowed him to use a studio on the last floor of the Conservatory of Music Benedetto Marcello. He spent the summer in Cadola (near Ponte nelle Alpi, Belluno), where the artist Guido Cadorin hired his help for the completion of a large fresco for the local church. The marvel of "coming back to life" shines through the watercolours of the period, depicting Venetian views of the Zattere, the Canale della Giudecca, Canal Grande and Rialto. At the same time, Music started working on some of the subject that he had already explored before the deportation; the Karst expanses of Dalmatia, with its horses, the drystone walls, the donkeys and the women walking to the market under the sun. Visions of peace, of simplicity, of moved love towards that land, but still filtered by the experience of the concentration camp.

In 1948, Music exhibited for the first time at the Biennale in Venice, showing two paintings that received the critics' accolade. Massimo Campigli introduced him to Salomè and Eric Estorick, collectors that supported Music throughout his life. Oskar Kokoschka visited his studio every time he was in Venice. Alix de Rothschild became his first French collector. Mark Tobey, his gallerist Sellinger and the American writer Carson McCullers admired his works. During his train journeys to Rome, Music became fascinated by the landscape he was passing though, and started working on sketches of the Crete landscape around Siena. In Zurich, he produced some lithographs for the editions of Arta, Wolfensberger and Guilde de la Gravure. In September 1949, Zoran Music married Ida Barbarigo in Venice. In this period, he produced also his first drypoint engravings. In 1950 Music exhibited at the 25<sup>th</sup> Venice Biennale, where he was awarded the Gualino award. The following year he was awarded, together with Antonio Corpora, the "Priz de peinture" at the Prix de Paris, that had been organized for that year in Italy by Massimo Campigli and Gino Severini. The prize consisted of a personal exhibition at the Galerie de France in Paris and the publication of a monograph. In 1952 the solo exhibition was therefore organised at the Galerie de Paris, curated by Gildo Caputo and

Myriam Prevot. The commentary in the monographic catalogue, edited by the Centre d'art italienne di Parigi, was by Jean Bouret, whose friendship and support would be of fundamental importance to Music throughout his life. The Parisian gallery offered him a contract that enabled Music to move permanently to Paris, while still keeping the studio in Venice. In Paris Music worked in the same studio previously used by Chaim Soutine, 16 rue St. Gothard in Montparnasse. In 1953 he landed in New York, with an exhibition at the Cadby Birch Gallery. Patti Birch, the gallerist, was a collector and admirer of Music's works. She was a young and knowledgeable collector that for several years had also been buying paintings for important American museums by artists such as Morandi and Marino Marini.

In 1955 Music was working at the Lacourière studio in Montmartre, creating etchings and graphic works, some of which were published by Nesto Jacometti, Klippenstein, and Guilde de la Gravure among others. In the same year, he exhibited both at the Arthur Jeffress Gallery in London, where he met the acclaimed art critic Denys Sutton, and at the Quadriennale in Rome. In this occasion, he met Irene Bin and Gaspero Del Corso, owners of the Galleria dell'Obelisco in Rome, with whom he started a fruitful collaboration. In 1958, Music exhibited again at the Galerie de France and in 1960 he was awarded the UNESCO prize at the Venice Biennale. In 1961 Bruno Lorenzelli, an important dealer of ancient and modern art, exhibited Music's works in his gallery in Milan and bought a large collection of these. In 1962, Rolf Schmucking published the catalogue of the graphic works produced between 1947 and 1962 on the occasion of the retrospective exhibition held at the Museum of Brunswick and Hans Peter Londolt bought for the Kunsthäus Basel a group of 26 drawings, including ten from Dachau.

In 1970 Music worked on the group of paintings "Nous ne sommes pas les derniers" ("We Are Not the Last"). The title was a reference to the hope of the survivors of Dachau that this was the last time something this terrible could happen in the history of mankind, to be therefore "the last". However, the persistence of massacres and genocides throughout the world in those years, in Korea, Vietnam, South America, led the artist to state "Nous ne sommes pas les derniers" ("We Are Not the Last"). The works were exhibited at the Galerie de France in Paris that same year. The following year the works of this group became and exhibition, shown first at the Haus der Kunst in Munich, then at the Palais des Beaux-Arts in Brussels, and finally at the Museum in Trier curated by Kurt

Schweches. Many of the paintings of this series were acquired by international museums such as the Centre Pompidou in Paris, the Munich Museum and museums in Jerusalem, Venice, Copenhagen, Oslo. In 1972 Jacque Lassaigne organized a retrospective at the Musée d'Art Moderne in Paris, the first one ever to be dedicated to a living artist, while in 1974 Giuseppe Mazzariol set up a solo exhibition at the Fondazione Querini Stampalia in Venice. In 1977, Ole Henrik Moe, the director of the Sonia Henie-Niels Ustad Foundation, organised an exhibition in Hovikodden, Oslo.

It was followed, in 1980, by a retrospective at the Galleried dell'Accademia in Venice, curated by Francesco Valcanover and accompanied by a monographic catalogue. Between 1981 and 1982, Music went back to the Venetian subjects, such as Canale della Giudecca and Punta della Dogana. He was awarded the title of Commandeur des Arts et des Lettres in Paris, while around the same years, Patti Birch acquired a large group of twenty works from the series "Nous ne sommes pas les derniers" for private collection. In 1983 Music exhibited at the Galerie Claude Bernard in Paris and started working on the series of cathedrals' interiors. The Biennale in Venice dedicated a room to his works, and an important exhibition was held at the Ala Napoleonica of Museo Correr, in Venice, curated by Giuseppe Mazzariol. In 1984, Sergio Grandini published in Lugano an album of 26 drawings by the artist. Few years later, in 1987, Music started working on the series of the self-portraits, and started his collaboration with Galleria d'Arte Contini. Between 1988 and 1990, along with the self-portraits, he worked on the "Atelier" series, which was presented at the Basel Art Fair by the Krugier-Ditesheim Gallery. In 1991 he was appointed Officier de la Legion d'Honneur by the French President François Mitterrand. In 1992 important exhibitions were held in Rome, Milan, and by the Jan Krugier Gallery in New York, in 1993 at Galleria d'Arte Contini Art Gallery in Cortina d'Ampezzo and in 1994 at the Centre Cultural Bancaixa in Valencia, Spain. In 1995 an important retrospective, held at the Grand Palais in Paris, was curated by Jean Clair and showed 261 works by the artist. Towards the end of the year, under the direction of Wieland Schmeid, the Bayerische Academy of Munich opened an exhibition entitled, "The years of Maturity". In 1997 Sabina Schulze curated an exhibition that covered the entirety of Music's production, from 1945 to 1997 at the Schirn Kunsthalle Gallery in Frankfurt. During the following years, Music was engaged in numerous collaborations with various international galleries.

Zoran Music died in Venice in 2005.
